

RIBA President's Award for Research – Outstanding University-located Research

Terms of Reference and Eligibility

This annual award will be given to a completed research project located in a University which is considered to make an exceptional contribution to architectural knowledge and understanding. Work in any area of architecture, including architectural design research, by academics in any department which has a course validated by the RIBA, in the UK or overseas will be eligible.

- Submission to be a single completed research project, not the career of an individual researcher.
- Research projects led by non-RIBA members are eligible.
- Research projects led by academics in any department which has a course validated by the RIBA, are eligible.
- Candidates are allowed one submission per year per award.
- If no candidate satisfies the criteria, the award will not be given.

Judging Criteria

Contribution to Architecture: All submissions are assessed in terms of the degree to which they contribute new knowledge and understanding to architecture.

This contribution will be considered in terms of:

- **Originality:** the degree to which the research produces new insights and innovations in architecture.
- **Significance:** the degree to which the research has influenced, or has the potential to influence, knowledge and understanding in architecture.
- **Rigour:** the intellectual precision and/or systematic method and/or integrity embodied in the research.
- **Communication:** the degree to which the work communicates clearly through written, visual and spatial language, and where appropriate, engages audiences beyond specialists in the field.

Submission and Nominations

Nominations should be made within a year of the research being completed (in the case of projects funded by Research Councils) or within two years of the major publication resulting from the research. Work can only be submitted once.

Submission to be nominated by the Head of School. **All documents must be submitted in the English language.**

The following material must be provided for a full submission:

1. **Application Form** (pro forma supplied): The individual researcher/lead member of the research team will need to complete a Submission Form providing key contact information and details of any publications derived from the research. In the case of a submission from a research team, information about the key members of the research team should be provided.

2. Full Documentation of the Research: All submissions should include full documentation of the research: for example a book, or a maximum of three papers, a final project report, a portfolio.

Architectural design research (such as artefacts, buildings, designs, events, installations, interactive or time-based media, prototypes and software) can be submitted in the form of an annotated portfolio, which must be received in hard or electronic form.

- i The role of this annotated portfolio is to explain the research contribution of the design.
- ii The annotated portfolio may include limited video material in an accessible format such as DVD where the form of output makes this essential.
- iii One page of images may be submitted for any application and is recommended for design research.
- iv The annotated portfolio may include critics' reviews.
- v Software must be submitted in the form of a DVD or CD-ROM in order to avoid accessibility problems.

Only shortlisted submissions will be considered in full.

3. 1000-word Statement: This will be used to shortlist submissions and should summarise the research and describe how it contributes new knowledge and understanding to architecture (in terms of originality, significance and rigour). The statement should address the following:

- i. **Research Questions:** describe the questions which the research sets out to address, explore and/ or answer, and how these questions are original.
- ii. **Research Aims and Objectives:** describe what the research seeks to achieve in terms of the pursuit of new knowledge and understanding.
- iii. **Research Context:** describe the research context, and how the research has extended, developed and/ or innovated knowledge and understanding within this context (this may be within or across disciplinary boundaries).
- iv. **Research Methods and Processes:** describe the research methods and processes adopted, and how these address issues of originality and rigour – for example through innovation, critique and attention to detail.
- v. **Dissemination:** describe the form(s) in which the research has been disseminated, and define its significance in terms of impact (including where relevant evidence such as reviews, awards and critical acclaim).

4. CV (no more than two sides of A4): This will be used to shortlist submissions and should be submitted for the individual researcher/lead member of the research team and include qualifications, career history, major achievements and a list of publications. All projects/publications derived from the research submitted should be marked with an asterisk* in the CV. In the case of a research team, an additional CV for up to two other key members of the team can be provided.

5. Supporting Statements: These will be used to shortlist submissions and should not be written by the applicant, but by referees. The Supporting Statement should describe the research submitted in relation to the judging criteria (originality, significance, rigour and communication). N.B: This is not a lifetime achievement award and so the Supporting Statement should not describe the applicant's career to

date. Two Supporting Statements must be included. Electronic copies will be accepted but must be sent by the Statement's author.

Judgement and Announcements

Submissions to the award will be assessed by a Judging Panel established by the RIBA Research & Development Committee.

Entries must be submitted by **Monday 15 June 2009, 5pm** to be considered over the Summer. The presentation of the Awards will be made at the ceremony for the RIBA President's Medals. Reasonable travel expenses within the UK to the event will be reimbursed for the award winner and a companion.

The Award

The Award will be a certificate and a citation from the President. There will also be the opportunity to feature the research in the RIBA Journal and on the RIBA website.

Winners have the right to refer to the award in publicity and PR material etc. (e.g. on headed paper "Winner of the RIBA President's Award for Research – Outstanding University-located Research, 2009").

The Judges may award commendations to one or more other shortlisted submissions.

There is no entry fee and no money prize.

Conditions

The judging panel has the right to change the category of a submission (e.g. from University-located to Professional-practice located).

Submission of an application for the award constitutes the applicant's agreement to permit the RIBA to publish all or part of the research abstract, including the identity and contact information of the project leader(s). The intent is to disseminate information about ongoing and recent research as widely as possible in the architectural community and beyond.

With the exception of final research outputs (books/portfolios) the documents submitted will not be returned.

Past Winners

2006 – Dr. Wendy Pullan of the University of Cambridge won the award for Outstanding University-led Research with her work, *Conflict in Cities: Architecture and Urban order in Divided Jerusalem*.

2007 – Dr. Tatjana Schneider and Professor Jeremy Till of the University of Sheffield won the award for Outstanding University-located Research with their work, *Flexible Housing*.

2008 – Murray Fraser from the University of Westminster with Joe Kerr from the Royal College of Art won the award for Outstanding University-located Research with their work *Architecture and the 'Special Relationship': The American Influence on Post-War British Architecture*.
