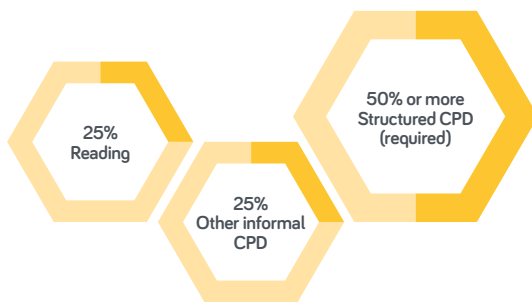
### Is off-site the future of construction?
