

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Introduction

The collection of accurate data is essential for any professional organisation. It informs policy development and service delivery, it provides a sound basis for response to government and other bodies and it allows professional organisations to construct a bigger picture of trends emerging in their sector.

Every year the RIBA Education Department conducts a survey of schools of architecture and the data is used to establish the raw facts about architectural education in the UK. This document describes the results of the Schools of Architecture survey for 2011/12, and compares the results with figures for the last five years.

I would like to thank, in particular, heads of Schools and departmental administrators for responding so positively, again, to this year's survey and for providing all the detailed information we require. I am delighted to report that all Schools participated in this year's survey.

This year we have expanded the analysis to give more detail about students from outside the UK (adding time series data for Part 2 and splitting EU from outside EU); new entrants to Part 2 (new analysis of ethnic origin and entry qualifications); long-term staffing trends; long-term progression of students by ethnic origin; and a new section examining how many architecture students have a disability.

This year's figures show the number of new entrants to Part 1 is flat, while the number of entrants to Part 2 is up on last year. The total number of students in all years is higher than last year but not as high as figures recorded in the two peak years previously. Schools predict a 7 per cent fall in new entrants to Part 1 in 2012/13, but no change at Part 2.

This year sees a number of 'all time high' figures, continuing previously recorded long-term growth in numbers: students passing Part 1 and Part 2 examinations are at the 'highest ever'; while new record highs are recorded in the percentage of students who are women applying to courses, entering at Parts 1 and 2, and passing Part 2 examinations.

Applications

Over 25,000 applications were made to Schools of Architecture for courses starting in October 2011. This is the equivalent of 6.9 applications per place filled. The average is higher for Candidate courses (8.6 applications per place filled) than for Validated Schools (6.9 applications for full-time courses).



Entry Qualifications

Thirty seven Schools were able to provide information about the entry qualifications of new entrants to Part 1 courses.

The majority of new entrants (64 per cent) to these Schools came via UCAS with a A-Levels, Scottish Highers or International Baccalaureate. Ten per cent entered with a Level 3 qualification (including vocational 16-19), 1 per cent with Level 4 and 2 per cent Level 5. Eight per cent entered with qualifications from outside the UK, including 1 per cent with a degree. Three per cent of entrants were Mature candidates.

New Entrants to Part 1

3,767 students entered RIBA Validated Part 1 architecture courses in 2011/12. This is almost identical to the numbers recorded in three out of the last four years. The number of part-time new entrants is higher than last year but for the last three years has been substantially lower than the number entering up to 2008/09.

The proportion of women students on Validated courses has increased slightly to 46 per cent, up from 44 per cent last year.

The number of new entrants to the *second* year of Part 1 Validated courses is 195, lower than in the previous year.



Figure 3: New entrants to Part 1 2011/12 (validated courses only)






Figure 4: Ethnic origin of UK New Entrants to first year Part 1, 2011/12




Thirty three Schools were able to provide information relating to the ethnic origin of UK new entrants to Part 1 courses.

The UK student intake at these Schools is 73 per cent white. Eleven per cent are Asian or Asian British, 5 per cent Black or Black British.

Figure 5: New Entrants from outside the UK to first year Part 1, trends over the last five years




The number of new entrants to Part 1 from outside the UK has fallen back slightly from last year's all-time high but remains significantly higher than in the years before 2010/11. Students from outside the UK now account for 28 per cent of new entrants to validated courses. This year we have split 'outside the UK' into EU and outside EU. Over the last five years, the number of students from the EU has increased by 25 per cent, while the number from outside the EU is 36 per cent higher.

Europe remains the largest single source of new entrants from outside the UK (57 per cent); Asia is the next largest source, at 33 per cent.

New Entrants to Part 2

1,761 students entered RIBA Validated Part 2 courses in 2011/12. This is 4 per cent higher than last year but still lower than in the two preceding years.

The proportion of new entrants to Part 2 who are women is 41 per cent, higher than the 40 per cent recorded last year and the fifth consecutive year in which this figure has increased.



Figure 8: New entrants to Part 2 2011/12 (validated courses only)



The entry qualifications to Part 2 are recorded for the first time this year. The vast majority of new entrants to Part 2 - 85 per cent - enter Part 2 with a UK first degree. Another 4 per cent enter with a degree from outside the UK while 7 per cent have a second UK degree.

Figure 9: Qualifications of new entrants to Part 2, 2011/12






Figure 10: Ethnic origin of UK New Entrants to first year Part 2, 2011/12



The UK student intake at Part 2 is 83 per cent white, higher than the 73 per cent figure for Part 1. Seven per cent are Asian or Asian British (compared with 11 per cent at Part 1), 3 per cent Black or Black British (compared with 5 per cent at Part 1). This information is provided by 34 Schools.

Figure 11: New Entrants from outside the UK to first year Part 2, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)




The number of overseas new entrants to Part 2 has increased in 2011/12 and now stands at its highest level in five years. Since 2007/08, the number of entrants from the EU has increased by 24 per cent and from outside the EU by 38 per cent.

Like new entrants to Part 1, Europe accounts for over half (53 per cent) of new entrants from outside the UK to Part 2. Thirty six per cent originate from Asia.

Students of All Academic Years

More than 14,000 students are studying architecture in 2011/12 at Part 1 and Part 2 (Validated courses). This number is 1.6 per cent higher than last year although remains slightly lower than in the two peak years of 2008/09 and 2009/10. The number of part-time students has fallen in each of the past three years.

Figure 13: All students, 2011/12 (validated courses only)




Figure 14: Students of all years, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)




Future Intakes

Part 1

Schools predict a drop of 7 per cent in the number of new entrants to Part 1 courses in 2012/13. The number of new entrants to Candidate Courses is forecast to fall by more than those to Validated Courses.



Part 2

The number of new entrants to Part 2 courses is expected to remain stable in 2012/13. Within the overall stability, Schools with Validated Courses predict a fall of 2 per cent compared with a substantial rise, of 21 per cent, reported by Schools with Candidate Courses.



Examination Results

These figures refer to examinations taken during the academic year 2010/11. A total of 825 students passed Part 3 exams to qualify as Architects in 2010/11. This is 10 per cent lower than the previous year's record high and the lowest figure recorded in the last six years.

Examination pass rates were 89 per cent at Part 1, 91 per cent at Part 2, and 83 per cent at Part 3.

Figure 17: Examination results, 2010/11 (validated courses only) (* see note below)



Progression of Women Students

In this comparison of cohorts of students over time we assume that students take Part 1 finals in Year 3, Part 2 finals in Year 6 and Part 3 finals in Year 7 of their seven year education.


Historically the figures suggest a female dropout rate of about 2 percentage points between Parts 1 and 2, and another 2 percentage points between Parts 2 and 3. Only in two out of the last eight complete years has this differential fallen to near zero. In no cohort year has the proportion of women passing Part 3 exceeded the proportion of women entering Part 1.

The figures do show that there has been a rise in the proportion of women at all stages, particularly applicants and new entrants to Part 1.

Ethnic Origin of Students

This year the proportion of new entrants to Part 1 who are white is 73 per cent. This rises to 83 per cent of those passing Part 3 examinations - unchanged from last year.

The information, provided this year by 34 Schools, has been analysed to track the cohort of students who start their architecture course each year, in the same way as table 19 does for women. The analysis suggests the proportion of non-white students declines between Parts 1 and 3 of the architecture course.

Staffing

Staffing numbers have continued to fall in 2011/12, and are lower by another 2 per cent compared with the previous year. Within this overall figure, the number of teaching staff is lower by 5 per cent, while the number of support staff is 6 per cent higher.

On average, each School has 13.2 full-time teaching staff, 7.3 part-time teaching staff (contract), 5.5 part-time teaching staff (hourly paid); plus 6.6 full-time and 1.5 part-time support staff.

Figure 20: Teaching staff, 2010/11






Disability

Statistics relating to students' disabilities were collected last year but have been refined in this year's survey, with the help of researchers at the University of the West of England. Last year's data is no longer comparable with the new definitions used so no trends can yet be measured. Over the coming years, Figure 23 below will develop to reveal trends in the number of students with a disability.

Schools report that 9 per cent of students have a disability. The largest source of disability is a learning impairment, (7 per cent of all students). About 1 per cent of students have a mental health issue and another 1 per cent an 'unseen' disability. A further 1 per cent of students have other disabilities as detailed in the table below.
